MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Causes and Conditions: 80 Years Later

How inconceivable the causes and conditions that led me to represent the Parker Dam Reception Center, which was part of the Poston Relocation Camp where the Kiyohara Family was illegally incarcerated during the Pacific War, during the Opening Ceremony of the Japanese American National Museum *Ireichō* Monument to the more than 125,000 people who were arrested, detained, and/or incarcerated in the "camps" and "centers" and prisons operated by the US Army, Department of Justice, Wartime Civil Control Administration, and War Relocation Authority.





My mother and father, grandfathers and grandmothers, uncles and aunties on both the Kiyohara and Nakawatase sides of the family were incarcerated, despite being lawful immigrants or native-born

US citizens, as in the case of my parents.

Like many *Nisei* second generation Japanese-Americans, my mom and dad never talked very much about the camps—mom was too young to remember very much and when dad talked about the camps, it wasn't about the injustice but rather how the community came together and built a swimming pool, organized a Boy Scout Troop and baseball teams, Buddhist communities...and how they went fishing all

the time! Poston was unusual in that the camp was not enclosed by barbed wire but hundreds of miles of Arizona desert.

Even if you tried to escape, there was literally nowhere to go—plus, they had Boy Scouts, a swimming pool, baseball diamond, and a river for fishing!

Today, 80 years later, the numbers of remaining internees (including our mom) are dwindling and so arose the movement to build a monument at the Japanese American National Museum, which coincidentally is housed in the original Nishi Hongwanji Temple in Little Tokyo in Los Angeles.

I was asked to represent Maui (Haiku Camp Detention Station)—and by sheer coincidence happen to be a descendent of internees on both sides (Poston and Tule Lake), a native-born Los Angeles boy, and a graduate of USC, which is one of the sponsors. The Rev. Dr. Duncan Williams, an ordained Zen priest and professor at USC, is the driving force behind the project.

In reflection, it would be all-too-human to remain attached to outrage and anger over the injustice of the forced incarceration of US citizens for the "crime" of being genetically "Japanese," which goes against everything America stands for (in theory). But Buddhism challenges us to transcend "human" ego, to seek the deeper meaning of the causes and conditions that led me to this day.



If not for the attack on Pearl Harbor, if not for the relocation camps, the Kiyohara and Nakawatase families would not have moved to Los Angeles, my mom and dad would not have met at a Jr. YBA dance, fallen in love, gotten married, and raised three children.

If not for the injustice forced upon the Kiyohara and Nakawatase families, I quite simply wouldn't be here because my parents would not have met, I wouldn't be the person I am today, I would not be the resident minister of a Hongwanji Temple in upcountry Maui, and I wouldn't be writing this reflection!



The fundamental teaching of Buddhism is "everything and every thing" arises from Causes and Conditions, and that which arises from causes and conditions is not permanent, is constantly changing, is not the same as it was mere seconds ago. The Truth of Impermanence can be seen in every aspect of our unrepeatable life—if we choose to wake up to it.

Open your eyes, and you'll see...a commuter train in Los Angeles! This LA boy finds it hard to believe that I can take a train from Union Station in downtown Los Angeles to Buena Park in Orange County and be there in 30 minutes!

Wake up and smell the ramen! Little Tokyo and Downtown LA are now "cool and trendy"? Back in the day, Little Tokyo was a tiny pocket of Japanese-American-ness, a historic community surrounded by the homeless of Skid Row (two blocks south). Today, Little Tokyo is totally packed on weekends and even weekday evenings with young people having a good time!

I'm profoundly grateful to the temple leadership and members for giving me the chance to reconnect with where I come from, to be reminded of my debt of gratitude to so many that I must endeavor to repay "even though I be crushed" (from *Ondokusan*), and for creating the time, place, and occasion, for me to remember, reflect, and rededicate myself to repaying my debt of gratitude for this unrepeatable life, the people and places in it, and for the Great Love and Great Compassion of Amida Buddha working in my life to lead me, just as I am, to go forth to Birth into the Pure Land.

Fifty Years Ago... at the dedication of the new Makawao Hongwanji Temple, Reverend Chikai Yosemori wrote the following article. With appreciation, we look back.....



September 11, 1971

Today, it is with utmost pleasure that I participate in this memorable occasion of dedicating this new and beautiful Makawao Hongwanji Temple, edifice of worship, and at the same time, may I express my deepest appreciation to all who made this happy event possible.

In pre-World War 2nd era, Paia Camp, which was said to be the largest plantation camp in the State of Hawaii, boasting the largest number of Japanese employees, was finally forced to be closed as a result of tremendous sociological changes in post-war Hawaii, and through the process of streamlining operations in the sugar industry. Hence, the formerly populated areas were either reverted back into sugar cane fields or left unattended to become unsightly forest, leaving no trace of its former self.

Paia Hongwanji was no exception, and like Paia Camp, it was finally forced to be abandoned. However, the Teaching of the Nembutsu, nurtured and developed over a period of 60 years in this district, was not to be destroyed. New land was obtained in the Makawao district, on the foothills of Mt. Haleakala in East Maui, and under the name, "Makawao Hongwanji" it will again resume its religious and social activities.

I am fully cognizant of the fact that to make this day possible it required the unceasing efforts of our membership and the heart-warming assistance of non-members to overcome many obstacles which stood in our path, and may I again express my sincere appreciation to all -- thank you very much.

In closing, may I exhort all of you to work in unison in all sincerity to better our Kyodan so it would become better able to discharge its role of propagating the Teachings of the Buddha, and thus be able to contribute to the welfare of our community and to World Peace.

- 1. Treasurer's Report: Report submitted.
- 2. Minister's Report:
 - Japanese language Saturday classes had 20 students signed up.
 - Classes for Buddhist Scout Sangha Award will start soon.
 - Sunday Service Dharma messages will have lay speakers when Rev. Kerry is away: Sept. 18, Sept. 25, Oct. 9, and November 13.
- 3. Mortgage Prepayment in 2022: Finance Director Glenn Hamai recommended paying down the Peach lot rental mortgage. Motion made and Council approved.
- 4. Obon 2022 Wrap Up: Discussed whether Obon should be one night or two nights. No decision made. Diane Kosaka will be Kitchen/Food Coordinator.
- 5. Celebration October 16, 2022: Co-Chairs Karen and Diane reported that invited guests are Dr. Warren Tamamoto, JoAnn Yosemori, Grant Ito, Eric Yosemori, and Rev. Umitani, Yoshiko Umitani, and Riho Umitani. So far, 21 Keirokai members will be attending.
- 6. December 2022 Garage Sale: Co-Chairs Karen and Gail reported that December 3, 2022 is date for next garage sale.
- 7. Peace Day 2023: Motion was made by Jean Heselden to hold a Special Service on Saturday, September 16, 2023, for the whole island of Maui to participate. Council approved.
- 8. Japanese Class: Three levels of classes will be offered. Classes will be held in the Social Hall on Saturday mornings, lasting 45 minutes each, and starting at 8:30 am, 9:30 am, and 10.30 am. Class fee is \$25 registration per year plus \$5 per class or \$20 per month. Instructor is Ms. Tokie Ogawa, a native Japanese speaker who is trained as a Japanese language instructor and as an ESL instructor.
- 9. Citizenship in Society merit badges for the Scouts and Cub Scouts: Rev. Kerry is serving as advisor for this badge which focuses on diversity, equality, inclusion, and ethical leadership.
- 10. Membership: Report submitted. Committee sent 30 reminder letters to pay dues.
- 11. Funeral/Columbarium: Report submitted.
- 12. Maui District Hongwanji Council: Clyde Hamai reported that with the retirement of Rev. Tennes from Kahului Hongwanji, the remaining 3 Maui ministers are rotating through to officiate Kahului's Sunday services.
- 13. Jr. YBA: Held an overnighter at MHM last weekend. They Baked Manju for fundraiser and sold out.
- 14. BWA: Bobbi reported that Makawao's BWA will be donating the proceeds of the Senior Fair to the 50th anniversary celebrations.
- 15. Scouts and Cub Scouts, Rev. Kerry serving as advisor for Sangha, Metta, and Citizenship Merit Badges. Boy Scout Jamboree will be held July 19—28, 2023, in West Virginia.
- 16. Preschool: Currently 20 students. Still seeking another full time preschool teacher to increase enrollment.
- 17. Project Dana: The Senior Program enjoyed a tofu patties cooking demonstration by Iwa Yoshioka. A potluck lunch and craft project were also enjoyed.



BISHOP'S CORNER July 2022

HHMH Statement on Environmental Harmony

Joint Statement by Bishop Eric Matsumoto and Steve Lohse, Chair of the Green Hongwanji Committee, Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii





We experience rapid, extreme environmental change as crises, and when our environment is in crisis, we suffer. We depend on the environment for everything, including stable climate, public health, clean air and water, energy, fertile soil, healthy food, land and sea resources, and the biodiversity that underlies sustainability. Environmental crises give rise to social, economic, political, and spiritual crises that in turn further degrade the environment. We are inescapably interdependent with the environments that we abuse as well as with the environments that we protect.

The causes of environmental crises are not external threats, we do this to ourselves. As our sheer numbers, consumer expectations, and developing technologies combine to overwhelm natural systems, we are witnessing an era of transition from life defined by natural processes to environments defined by human activity. Sadly, it is increasingly clear that greed, anger, ignorance, and ego-driven human activities are out of harmony with sustainable natural systems. Meanwhile, global responses to environmental degradation remain inadequate and directed largely at symptoms rather than causes.

As Buddhists, we see a way forward. We see that environmental harmony arises from Interdependence and from addressing root causes of environmental crises – our own greed, anger, and ignorance. We see that inner transformation, from ego-driven thinking to Dharma-guided entrusting, prepares us to understand and commit to wise, compassionate, effective action for environmental harmony. Just as Buddha touched the Earth as bearing witness to Enlightenment, so we touch the Earth to bear witness to Dharma guidance that inspires us to engage in skillful environmental action as an Earth Touching Sangha.

David Loy said, "Engagement in the world is how our personal awakening blossoms." As we go to the Dharma for guidance to live in harmony and sustainability with our precious planet, we commit to the following:

- understanding the inherently interdependent, holistic nature of Buddhism;
- transforming environmental actions by first transforming environmental thinking;
- teaching clean, healthy, sustainable environments as a basic human right;
- acting effectively, always informed by Cause/Effect and scientific best practices;
