As an ordained priest of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha, overseas missionary assigned to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, and resident minister of the Makawao Buddhist Temple, causes and conditions often force me to reflect upon "time" — sometimes it seems "there isn't enough time in a day!"

And yet, I regularly "waste" time, kill "time", or "make time" for satisfying self-centered cravings and attachments. "Time" is of course an essential part of life, an extremely convenient conceptual construct created by human beings to measure the passing of days and nights, prepare for the changing of seasons, and mark significant and meaningful life stage events.



I confess to being a big procrastinator! Part of the reason is my creativity as a writer is driven by fear, stress addiction, and caffeine (daily) and nicotine (not anymore), and more recently a tendency to forget stuff! But in reality-as-it-is, I simply assume (and convince myself) that "the sun will come up tomorrow"—that I "still have time."

The Buddha taught the **Truth of Impermanence**—the constantly changing nature of all things, beings, phenomena, and events that arise from causes and conditions. As a child, I delighted in Rev. Tetsuo Unno's telling a children's story about time that leads to the true understanding of the truth, "tomorrow never comes"—the life-changing realization we have only this moment of this day of an unrepeatable life. As adults, we know "tomorrow never comes" but still want to believe (and tell others) "every day is a new day"! And yet we see the truth of the wisdom of Mother Theresa's words.

Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We have only today. Let us begin.

-- Mother Theresa (1910-1997)

Shinran-shōnin always emphasized he was simply sharing the "shinshū" (true essence) of "Jōdo" Pure Land Buddhism as taught by his revered master and great teacher Hōnen-shōnin. Shinran is said to have often quoted Hōnen-shōnin as saying:

Just say NamoAmidaButsu and be saved by Amida. Nothing else is involved.



Shinran taught that as ordinary unexceptional human beings, we are the object of Amida's Vow to Save All, that we are brought to hear and say Namo Amida Butsu, the Name of Amida, the Calling Voice of Amida implores us to say, "take refuge in Amida Buddha", to say the Name of Amida, to walk the Path of Nembutsu, the Path of Mindfulness of Amida in our everyday lives. NamoAmidaButsu!

So, why don't we simply and naturally "Just Say It. NamoAmidaButsu!" every moment of every day? Because of our (very human) ego-attachment to wanting to "understand" and to "explain" NamoAmidaButsu! before we say NamoAmidaButsu! Transcending the critically thinking mind requires a literal "leap of faith" to close the gap between the simplicity of Shinran's teaching of the Nembutsu, and what we experience in our everyday life: moments of sublime wonder, joy, inspiration together with very human loss, grief, and sorrow.

My personal, thus subjective, experience of the Faith of *Shinjin* continues in each moment of every day I wake up, get out of bed, and walk the Path of NamoAmidaButsu! The Nembutsu, NamoAmidaButsu!, comes to us through the Other Power of Amida <u>but</u> we also have to make the effort to humbly and gratefully receive the gift of Faith of *Shinjin*.

You're already on the Path of Nembutsu, NamoAmidaButsu. What are you going to do today?

May your day be filled with Aloha! NamoAmidaButsu!

She and the Paia ladies worked tirelessly in the kitchen, especially making nishime. Among her most important tasks was serving as a translator for the Reverends and their wives who didn't understand much English. She was a classical Japanese dancer, Karaoke singer, and determined hanafuda player. She once said, "Some people didn't like me because I was bossy.". But Florence was very dedicated to the church and got things done. Thank you, Florence Sakae.

<u>Hanako Hashimoto</u>, 104 years old, worked for many, many years alongside her husband John Hashimoto. She was a kyodan vice president, Bazaar co-chairperson, and vegetable & produce chairperson for Bazaar. She and the Kula ladies would come to help in the church kitchen when they could get away from their daily farmwork, bringing their fruits and vegetables to share with everyone. Hanako would be selling vegetables and produce at Bazaar time, first with their husband and eventually with her sons, grandchildren, and great-children. She always had a warm, happy smile for everyone. Thank you, Hanako Hashimoto.

Dharma Talk on Sunday January 7, 2024 By Wesley Kosaka

Teachings from Buddhism often spring from life's everyday experiences. Today, I'm going to talk about a journey through the fabric of existence, at least up to the point where I am now, and all the things that came before this moment. Many things in Dharma, or reality, can unexpectedly be great teachers of the values of Buddhism, like being the oldest sibling, having a large family, and even playing ping-pong.

Let's start with something that has been an essential part of my being since I was just barely two years old. Six days after my second birthday, I received the best present ever, a new baby sister. A measly few years after being born, I became a role model forever as the oldest child in a family. I began the difficult and tedious task of leading, carrying a lantern in the darkness of the night for my siblings to follow. It came with a silent responsibility, a duty to guide and protect, to light the way for those who come after. This simple accident of life, something no one can



plan for, mirrors the role of compassion and selflessness in Buddhism. Just as an older sibling cares for their younger ones, the Dharma teaches us to extend kindness and support to all beings, creating and helping a sense of unity and harmony.

Growing up in a big family is even another incredible teaching of the Dharma that I stumbled into without anything of my own. Just like being part of a tapestry, each thread is different but interwoven beautifully, creating a whole, something larger and better than each part.. There's chaos, laughter, and occasional disagreements, but underneath it all lies a deep sense of connection. This mirrors the concept of interdependence in Buddhism, where every being is interconnected, affecting and relying on one another. From this, we learn the value of patience, understanding, and the beauty of diversity.

Lastly, a game in my life that has been with me: for a very long time, ping pong. A seemingly simple game, yet rich and full with profound and remarkable teachings. In the seemingly small, yet potent exchanges of the tiny ball, we learn about focus, adaptability, and resilience. Every shot, a reminder of impermanence, as the ball is at your side of the table in one moment, gone the next. It's a reflection of life's fleeting nature, teaching us to embrace change and stay present in each moment.

In Buddhism, the Dharma is not confined to ancient texts or grand temples. It's found in the rhythm of our daily lives, in the quiet moments of reflection and amidst the bustle of activity. Just as an elder sibling teaches their younger siblings, life presents us with countless opportunities to learn and grow. Being attentive to these lessons, whether through family dynamics or a simple game of ping pong, unveils the Dharma's teachings. Patience and understanding, cultivated through the trials and joys of being an elder sibling, resonate with the Dharma's call for compassion and empathy. The tapestry of a big family interconnectedness preached by Buddhism, reminding us of our shared humanity.

Meanwhile, the ping pong table becomes a complete symbol of life's impermanence and the need for presence and adaptability. The essence of these experiences teaches us the core principles of Buddhism. Just as an elder sibling navigates the responsibilities of leadership, a big family exemplifies unity in diversity, and a ping pong match encapsulates life's fleeting nature, the Dharma whispers its timeless wisdom through these ordinary yet profound moments. Let these reflections guide us in our journey.

Embrace the responsibilities with an open heart, cherish the connections amidst diversity, and face life's unpredictability with adaptability. In these simple experiences lies the profound essence of the Dharma, beckoning us to awaken and find peace in the dance of life.
